What we did

Working with NEC Care who provide the Diabetic Eye Screening for the NHS, we hosted a free event for the people of Swindon. The aim of the event was to both raise awareness and provide information to help people live well with diabetes.

We invited various organisations, each offering support to help manage lifestyle choices and improve overall wellbeing at a central location in Swindon. These included Pharmacy, Diabetic Eye Screening, a Diabetic Nurse, Swindon Borough Council Live Well team, Xyla Health's Diabetes Prevention, Healthwatch, NHS Talking Therapies, Wiltshire Sight and Diabetes UK.



About NEC Care

NEC Care is part of the health division of NEC Software Solutions, which is a global organisation that builds software and services.

NEC Care delivers the national diabetic eye screening programme across several regions in England and Ireland. Their mission, vision and values are to provide people-centric services that aim to improve the health and wellbeing of those they serve.

The BSW Diabetic Eye Screening Programme provides retinal screening clinics and image grading to people with diabetes in Bath & North East Somerset, Swindon and Wiltshire (BSW). They are commissioned by NHS England to provide retinal screening on behalf of the NHS and their service is compliant with the National Service Framework (NSF) and National Screening Committee (NSC) guidance, standards, and objectives. They serve a population of c. 61,000 people with diabetes of which they screened around 52,000 in 2023-24.

Why?

In October 2023 we co-hosted our first Diabetes Event with NEC Care, Diabetic eye screening team. During which we received feedback and requests from attendees to hold another.

Following a change in venue, this year we were able to offer expertise from Nurses and Pharmacists to eye screening and more.

Swindon is fortunate to benefit from a diverse range of communities, our hope was to provide trusted advice to enable people to proactively manage their health and wellbeing.

The NHS defines diabetes as condition that causes a person's blood sugar level to become too high. There are 2 main types of diabetes:

<u>type 1 diabetes</u> – a lifelong condition where the body's immune system attacks and destroys the cells that produce insulin

<u>type 2 diabetes</u> – where the body does not produce enough insulin, or the body's cells do not react to insulin properly

Type 2 diabetes is far more common than type 1. In the UK, **over 90% of all adults with diabetes have type 2**.

High blood sugar that develops during pregnancy is known as <u>gestational</u> <u>diabetes</u>. It usually goes away after giving birth.

With varying symptoms for both type 1 and type 2, it's therefore important to know the key factors that may put you more at risk:

- Living with overweight or obesity
- Not having a healthy diet
- Family history of type 2
- Of Asian, Black African, or African Caribbean origin
- Long term use of certain medicines such as steroids
- Having high blood pressure
- Had gestational diabetes during pregnancy

People living with diabetes or at a higher risk of diabetes are advised to exercise regularly, eat healthily, and maintain a healthy weight. In addition, it is advised to try and cut down on alcohol and quit smoking.

Those diagnosed with diabetes are at an increased risk from diabetic retinopathy and damage to the nerves in their feet. If left un-checked and treated, both can cause life altering issues.

With so many health issues related to diabetes, providing this 'one stop shop' for the people of Swindon, provides the opportunity to reduce the impact of diabetes.
